Pretend you are the reporter, Chris. Interview Trevor about his experiences after Chapter 27. Write out the dialogue.	Pretend you are the main character and document the last two chapters of the book as if you're an influencer. Create illustrations as if they're photos.
List of Three: Complete your own "Pay It Forward"	Complete the Conclusion
After reading the novel, look for three different people you can "help" and ask them to "pay it forward" to three more people. After you complete the three tasks, you will create a journal entry similar to "Trevor's Journal" entry to explain how you completed your list.	After reading page 261, read: <i>A NOTE ABOUT THIS EDITION</i> from the author, Catherine Hyde Ryan. "After I stop writing, it's up to you. That's the magic of a story. It's a combination of your imagination and mine. Whatever happens in your mind is just as real as what happens in the mind of the author." *Write the conclusion to finish the book and complete the unfinished parts of the plot from the novel. Example: What happened to Trevor? What happened with Reuben and Arlene? What happened to the character who hurt Trevor?
